

WOULD NOT CORRECT IT.

Mrs. Florence Kelley Points Out an Error of the Tribune's.

Mrs. Florence Kelley, factory inspector, makes charges of misrepresentation and unfairness against the Chicago Tribune. She complains that in the report of the meeting of the Trades assembly published in Monday's issue of the paper named there was a misstatement which affects the office of factory inspection. The matter covered by the misstatement was made the subject of editorial comment in yesterday's issue of the Tribune. Mrs. Kelley sent a letter of correction to the Tribune, but the letter was denied insertion. The following is the letter of correction referred to:

STATE OF ILLINOIS, OFFICE OF FACTORY INSPECTOR, 247 WEST POLK STREET, CHICAGO, NOV. 7.—*To the Editor of the Tribune*—Dear Sir: In your issue of Monday last, in a report of the meeting of the Trades assembly, you refer to some resolutions there introduced and say: "They were introduced by Mrs. Kate Kavanagh, one of the factory inspectors appointed by Governor Altgeld." In this morning's editorials you deal with the enormity of Mrs. Kate Kavanagh's action by reason of her official position.

Reference to your news columns of July 13 will convince you that no Mrs. Kate Kavanagh has been appointed factory inspector in this State. The State inspectors there correctly enumerated, twelve in number, as provided by the law, are Mrs. C. P. Stevens, assistant; Mr. A. Bisno, Mrs. A. A.
