BRYTAIN BEGINS PAYMENT OF NATIONAL BIRTH BOUNTY.

Care Extended to Mothers Expected to Help Physical Conditions of People in Kingdom.

LONDON, Jan. 18 .- Beginning today, every child born in the United Kingdom to parents insured under the new national insurance act will bring the parents a bounty of 30 shillings, or about \$7.60. Under the new act the mother is also entitled to sickness beneat during the period of her lliness.

There are about 1,200,000 births annually in the United Kingdom and it is estimated that fully 1.000,000 of these will be entitled

to the insurance benefit. One effect of the scheme is expected to be an-improvement in the national physique. which is said to have suffered considerably

because so many mothers are denied necessities and are sometimes obliged to resume work before fully recovered.
