### SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

# Executive Board of the Jewish Training School, of Chicago, ILL.

To the President and Members of the Jewish Iraining School:

Our age, witness to so many radical changes in the beliefs, opinions, and institutions of men, is also seeing the new ideascoming into prevalence, that the object of true education is the upbuilding, the object of true charity the upholding of manhood. Education, we have learned, must develop the whole man, and because they were one-sided, the old educational methods are no longer suited to our age. They develop the brain, but not the hand and eye. They teach facts, but not how to use them; words, but not what they stand for. They strengthen the memory, but do not summon from their hiding place the countless powers latent in every child. The old methods failed to prepare man to fulfill all the purposes of life, and within the last quarter of a century a successful system of manual training was devised, in which the workshop was made a part of the school, in order to develop and strengthen the body, to exercise the powers of attention and perception, to unfold the constructive and inventive faculties, and to create a love of labor — in short, to prepare the pupil for life, and not for examinations.

In our day, too, charity has been elevated above the plane of mere sympathy. To feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to nurse the sick, to care for the widow and orphan, was once thought to be the full aim and scope of charity; to-day we recognize the truth that the end of all true charitable work is not blindly to obey the benevolent promptings of the heart, but to make a man out of a human being. We may give bread to the hungry and find a lodging place for the homeless, but that is not all of charity — yea, that may just fall short of being charity, for charity's object is to enable the hungry to feed themselves, and

the homeless to establish their own home; its purpose is to foster self-help and self-reliance, to enable the needy to lift themselves beyond the need of another's assistance, to educate the poor in thrift and honesty, independence and self-respect; to lend a helping hand to those who begin the struggle for existence, handicapped by adverse circumstances.

In recognition of these two truths, the noble-minded and generous-hearted Mr. Leon Mandel donated the magnificent sum of \$20,000 toward the establishment of a school for boys and girls, which shall furnish instruction according to the most improved principles of pedagogics, and at the same time shall equip the sons and daughters of our Jewish poor with the power of making a healthy, honest, and honorable livelihood, and with the desire of living in a respectable and self-respecting manner. No one will doubt that a great need for such an institution exists in this city. The past decade has brought to Chicago thousands upon thousands of Jewish immigrants from the most benighted and degrading sections of Europe. They have come hither but little affected by modern culture, ignorant of our language and our customs, and ignorant of the grand opportunities this free country offers its citizens; and almost without exception, they have domiciled themselves in wretched dwelling-houses in one section of the city, where they have created their own ghetto. It is as natural as night that the small quarters in which large families are domiciled should be unclean, and that those in whom persecution abroad developed a hereditary tendency to trading. should in this country make a livelihood by peddling or by unskilled labor.

This is an unfortunate state of affairs, but, endeavor all we will, it is barely possible to do much for the permanent social improvement of the adults. We must leave it to the free institutions of this country to improve them as best they may. But the children we can influence. Those saplings can still be bent. Of them we can still make clean, honest, useful, educated Americans. Of them we can still make men who will follow honorable pursuits, and women who will become good mothers and good housekeepers. Of them we can still make independent men who will not have to beg for our charity, but who will add dignity to labor by becoming skilled artisans.

It was to realize these noble purposes that Leon Mandel made his generous gift. When it became an assured fact, that the

Jews of Chicago would sustain the institution, the Fewish Training School was organized, May 8, 1888, to maintain a kindergarten for children too young to attend the public schools, a kitchengarden and sewing-school for girls more advanced in years, and particularly a manual training school where boys may learn to love work, find out for what kind of work they are best fitted, and receive that preparation and assistance which will make them intelligent, skillful, competent workmen, in that department best adapted to their abilities.

A constitution was adopted, and in accordance therewith sixteen directors were chosen, who administered the affairs of the association for the past two years. Their names have not been heralded abroad, nor have their deeds been trumpeted about; but in a quiet and unostentatious manner have they succeeded in basing the Jewish Training School upon a solid and permanent foundation, in purchasing a lot and giving out the contracts for a building which will be ready for occupancy in the fall, and in maintaining for the past two years a successful day-school, kitchen-garden, and sewing-school for girls.

The foundation of our organization is naturally its membership, which is now made up of five founders, twenty-two life members, eighty-six patrons, and two hundred and ninety members. From this source, besides the \$20,000 donation of Leon Mandel, we have been enabled to run our day-school, purchase a lot, and pay all but \$12,000 on our building, as contracted for. The ways and means committee suggests that this \$12,000 be raised by soliciting donations of not less than \$1,000, and that a suitable record of such donations be provided for, in recognition of the generosity of the donors. But in addition to this, united and strenuous efforts must be made to increase our annual income. During the embryonic stage of our organization, the \$2,961 derived from membership dues was more than sufficient to sustain our school, but this is just about one-third the amount that will be necessary next year, to conduct the various departments of our school in a satisfactory manner. The size and wealth of the Jewish population of this city warrant the conclusion, that our membership roll ought to contain 1,000 names, and by the concerted action of the friends of this movement this desideratum might easily be realized.

In order to best fulfill the purpose for which this school was founded, it was deemed expedient to purchase the lot for our

structure in the heart of that section of the city, where most of the poor Jewish immigrants of the city are located. We were fortunate in finding suitable grounds on Judd street between Clinton and Jefferson, a locality, in the immediate neighborhood of which, most of those children reside who need the training to be supplied by our school. There we purchased the corner lot, 55 feet front by 110 feet in depth, with a one and a half story brick cottage, for \$8,000 (and taxes for 1888 and accrued interest on mortgage thereon of \$4,000). And 27 feet west of this lot, we purchased 123 feet front by 110 feet in depth, with five frame cottages, for \$13,000 and 1 per cent. commission. We had also purchased the intervening lot of 27 feet frontage, but owing to what our attorneys deemed a defect in the title, we were compelled to surrender our contract for it. Upon the property twenty-seven feet west of the corner, there is now in the course of erection a magnificent three-story building 60 feet front by 100 feet in depth. The plans were designed by Messrs. Adler & Sullivan: all the contracts have been given out, and by about the first of September, there will be ready for occupancy a capacious building that will be a lasting monument to the generosity of Leon Mandel and the Jews of Chicago, that will be a credit to the city, and above all else, unto the neighborhood a promoter of modern civilization, the granary that will supply the seed that will sprout into good citizenship, and a noble and useful manhood and womanhood.

Having no permanent quarters, we utilized the parsonage of Sinai congregation during the past two years, to conduct a day school, industrial class, and kitchen garden. On account of the insufficient accommodations, the regular day school was not attended, at any one time, by more than twenty-five scholars. In punctuality and attention to their lessons, they compared favorably with pupils of their age at other schools, and in all the branches of instruction they have made satisfactory progress. Until compelled to resign, by reason of ill health, Miss Hattie Summerfield instructed in the English branches with rare ability, zeal, and conscientiousness. She was succeeded by Miss Emily Bloch, who brought to the performance of her duties that love for the work, that earnestness, and that pedagogical training, that have also rendered her efforts successful. We have nothing but praise for the instruction given by the Rev. J. Danek in German and by Miss Witkowsky in ethics. Besides imparting knowledge, these teachers have carefully noted the social and moral necessities of the children, and they have so successfully supplied them that a marked improvement is apparent in the general appearance, manners, and conduct of the children.

The industrial class, under Miss Reynolds, was attended by from seventy to ninety children, who are indebted to their teacher for the marked progress made by them in sewing, darning, mending, etc. The kitchen-garden was under the supervision of Mrs. Schroeder, whose refined manners, kind disposition, intelligence, and anxiety to do good, have eminently fitted her for her position of teacher and matron. The children in her charge have learned how to perform all the work entailed in cooking and housekeeping with neatness, quickness and propriety. They have all contracted habits of cleanliness, and although the beneficiaries of the school were few in number, we still have reason to believe that their good example will create a beneficial environment, and will help much toward effecting a moral and social reform in certain circles.

It is still too early to speak of the future. It augurs well, however, for the ultimate success of our enterprise, that we have secured Professor G. Bamberger as Principal of our institution. The Professor has enjoyed a thorough pedagogical education. and is enthusiastically devoted to manual training. For the past eleven years, i. e., since its incipiency, he has been the headmaster of the Workingmen's school, maintained in New York City by the Society of Ethical Culture, and it is to his ability, conscientiousness, and zeal, that the eminent success and reputation of the school are due. He comes to us rich in experience and full of enthusiasm, and it is reasonable to presume that under his supervision our school will prosper. Until his arrival, no definite curriculum for the next year can be determined upon. This much, however, we are able to state now, that in addition to kitchen-garden, industrial class, and manual training departments, we contemplate forming a large kindergarten, to bring the little children under favorable influence at a tender age, and also a night school for the instruction of adult immigrants in the English language.

The amount of real good work that can be accomplished by the Jewish Training School is beyond calculation, provided it furnishes the best instruction, and has the best management, and the best equipment. It should command all the resources necessary for conducting the institution on the wisest and broadest basis, and that necessitates the liberal support of the community, a large endowment, and a large income.

There is no Jewish charitable institution in Chicago, that has in such a short period of time received so many large donations from non-Jews as well as Jews. Leon Mandel has given us \$20,000. The Young Men's Hebrew Charity Association has contributed \$9,500. Messrs. Charles Schwab, H. A. Kohn, Emanuel Mandel, H. N. Higinbotham, have each subscribed \$5,000. Charles L. Hutchinson has donated \$1,000. Besides these, the following contributions have been received:

To these donors, most of whose names are thus made public for the first time, this and many generations to come are under lasting obligations. They have done nobly, and theirs is a shining example to the community of the true spirit of charity. But very nearly all of this money has been put into the Building Fund. The report of the Financial Secretary shows that we have but \$7,100 in the Sinking Fund, and that the annual income to be derived from the present membership will but just suffice to pay the salaries of two of our teachers.

The school has been founded, a building has been erected, and we are in honor bound to maintain them. We must have men and women who will pay off the \$12,000 indebtedness on the building. We must have men and women who will endow the school. We must have more patrons and members to sustain it.

This is not an eleemosynary institution. This is an educational institute to build up character, and to inspire self-reliance and self-respect. This is a preventive institution, to rescue from the slums of pauperism those whom oppression and persecution have degraded. This is a Jewish institution, to teach Jewish boys, with their hereditary tendencies toward commercial life, that "it is as honorable to be a greasy mechanic as a cleanly bookkeeper, that

the field of industry offers as broad and broader opportunities than those of commerce, that production is as honorable as distribution." And if this school can, with its special inducements of a sectarian character, make Jewish boys overcome the traditional habits and inclinations forced upon them by oppression, and if it can enable them to become once more skillful manual workers instead of traders, then the most liberal minded can not fairly object that this school is founded upon a sectarian basis, for it will aid in solving one of the great social problems of our day: Where are our skilled artisans to come from under the present system of unions and our extensive use of machinery? union limits the number of apprentices. "Society" frowns upon the artisan. Our public schools do not stimulate an ambition to cultivate the faculties for manual labor. The work in factories is now so subdivided that the labor of the individual is confined to a few manipulations, the workingman becoming a kind of unthinking machine. The industrial demand of the age is that the laboringman shall become more intelligent and skillful, do better work, and earn more money, and it is within the very province of the manual training school to supply this demand, for the reason that it will educate men who are true mechanics because they love work, because they understand machinery and the working of the forces of nature, because they possess intelligence and skill, and because they understand the principles which underlie not one, but many trades.

To assist the Jewish Training School will be an act of good citizenship, an act of humanity, an act of true religion, and when we appeal for the coöperation of the Jewish men and women of this city, we do so with the conviction that they will respond with the grace, and good will, and generosity, and unanimity characteristic of the inhabitants of the World's Fair city.

### THE MAX A. MEYER FUND.

After the above report had been submitted, the following communication was received:

CHICAGO, May 14, 1890.

To the Jewish Training School of Chicago:

By virtue of the powers vested in us, under the will of the late MAX A. MEYER, we hand you herewith, for the benefit of your association, under the conditions hereinafter named, check for Ten Thousand Dollars.

The principal of said sum shall be left permanently and safely invested by

you, and the total income thereof shall be applied by you from time to time toward the support and maintenance of your Training School.

The principal of said sum shall be kept by you, always separate and apart from your other funds, and shall be known as "The Max A. Meyer Fund."

Upon receipt of the communication, the following acknowledgment was engrossed and sent to the family of the deceased Max A. Meyer:

"The Board of Directors of the Jewish Training School of Chicago, having learned with great satisfaction of your action in selecting this institution as the recipient of the Max A. Meyer Fund, begs leave to return thanks to you for your kind remembrance of the institution, and to assure you of their willingness to comply with the conditions and stipulations under which the grant was made, as defined in your letter accompanying the remittance. By unanimous vote, it was resolved to add the name of MAX A. MEYER to the list of the "founders" of the school, and it will appear as such on the marble tablet to be provided and exposed in a suitable spot in the new building now in course of erection, to recall both to the beneficiaries and the visitors of the school, the names and memory of the generous donors and societies whose kindness alone enabled the erection of the edifice, and provided for the maintenance of the institution. Among the names so recorded, none will be remembered with greater gratitude than that of Max A. MEYER. From the incipiency of the movement, none was so earnest in its advocacy as he, none so eager for its speedy realization. His mind, so richly gifted, was among the first to recognize the urgent necessity of such a movement, and his sympathies always with the efforts to uplift the needy, led him to detect the hidden possibilities of future and permanent good to the whole community, apt to spring from such a school. Highly conscious of the distinction that comes to us by your selection, and encouraged to a great degree by your interest thus manifested, we make bold to believe that none of the many charitable movements, in which the sympathies of our deceased friend were enlisted, stood so near his heart as did ours. We are therefore rejoiced in the thought that, in the manner provided by the bequest, Max A. Meyer's name will forever be associated with us in our endeavor to provide a rational education for those among us who need it most; and his blessed memory will be the helping force to further the cause in the future.

We hope that the knowledge that we shall be among the foremost to cherish the recollections of our association with him in life, and to remember him now that he slumbers with the dust, will not be without gratification to you who have still holier and nearer reasons to remember him, and to consecrate to his memory the tribute of grateful affection.
